Raw materials are on show at the moment, from the local rock used in the stunning Seascape getaway to the raw ceramic of the Notch pendant and leather and wool of the Duffel ottoman. In all these designs, the materials shine and their natural textures are celebrated, a nod to New Zealand's rich, natural environment.

The new Notch pendants from award-winning design duo Well-Groomed Fox are a triumph of craftsmanship and meticulous design. The pendants are handmade to order in Nigel Groom and Emma Fox-Derwin's studio using traditional slip-casting and finishing techniques. The pair experimented with hundreds of porcelain dyes to fine-tune their seven bespoke colours: each hue is dyed into the opaque clay so the matt-finished shades are raw and unglazed for a beautiful effect. The lights are hand-finished, with small perforations notched into the top surface. Available in five sizes, each lamp comes with a simple matching porcelain ceiling rose. well-groomed-fox.com.

Homebase Collections has just launched Culy & Co with its first product, Geo Baby, a stunning side table originally made in the 1960s by Brian Culy's dad, David. The Duffel stool and ottoman are designed to be customisable to any locale. "The inspiration of the items in the Duffel Series was drawn from traditional drawstring duffel bags, often used by fishermen and military personnel," says designer Tim Webber. Hence the leather bottom section and the rope handles, which give a nod to the timeless styling of a duffel bag.
